

FEATURE ARTICLE - 01**Fostering BYOD in Academic Libraries: an Innovative Solution to Overcome the Economic Crisis**

BYOD, or ‘Bring Your Own Device’, is a policy that allows employees or students to use their personal devices for work or educational purposes instead of using company or college-provided devices. These devices include laptops, tabs, smartphones, etc. The term was first introduced by ‘Intel’ in 2009 and has since gained popularity in many workplaces and educational institutions including universities. BYOD policies have become increasingly popular in university libraries in recent years, as more students and faculty are using personal devices for learning and research. These policies offer several benefits to academic libraries, including increased access to resources, flexibility, and convenience for users. Many studies have found that BYOD policies tend to increase user satisfaction and engagement, as users are able to use their own familiar devices to access library resources. Additionally, BYOD policies can reduce the burden on library IT staff, as users are responsible for maintaining their own devices and resolving any issues.

Requirements for BYOD practices

Academic libraries must set clear guidelines and processes for users, including acceptable user regulations and instructions for safeguarding personal devices, in order to properly implement a BYOD policy. Creating BYOD policies and guidelines is crucial to ensuring that all academics and students understand the regulations and obligations that are involved with utilizing personal devices for research or education. Furthermore, libraries should invest in strong security measures such as firewalls and antivirus software, as well as provide

users with training and advice on how to secure their devices. With the BYOD concept, device compatibility is critical, and library patrons should be able to utilize their own devices within the existing infrastructure and software.

When considering security aspects, the BYOD program should also have robust security measures in place to secure sensitive data and information. Strong authentication and encryption mechanisms, remote wipe functionality, and the ability to monitor and manage devices should all be included. Staff should also be able to monitor personal devices to verify compliance with security standards, software updates, and other needs. BYOD programs in academic libraries should be tailored to protect the privacy and confidentiality of its customers. The policies should explicitly define the existing privacy safeguards and the implications of any inadequacies.

Implementing a BYOD strategy may incur additional costs, such as the requirement for additional security measures and support services. Therefore, to ensure the sustainability of the program, the organization or institution should carefully analyze the expenditures involved and prepare a budget. Providing Wi-Fi and charging facilities, and designing learning spaces that suit the BYOD concept should be a priority when fostering BYOD through academic libraries. Additionally, the BYOD policy should include user support for researchers or students, such as training on security best practices troubleshooting assistance, and tools for addressing technological concerns.

Practicing BYOD policies at academic libraries in Sri Lanka

Most university libraries in Sri Lanka are currently implementing BYOD policies to varied degrees, and this is a timely endeavour to solve the current financial constraints encountered by university libraries. Librarians are actively involved in remodeling the learning spaces in the current library set up to adopt the BYOD regulations, but they do not want to bear the cost of providing and maintaining computers and other devices for their users. The 'Information & Learning Centre' (Science Library) of the Faculty of Science at the University of Colombo is one of the success stories for implementing BYOD policies in the Sri Lankan context. The majority of the students of the Faculty of Science, University of Colombo bring their own devices (laptops/tabs, etc.) for study purposes and the learning spaces of the library are specifically designed to encourage BYOD policies and practices.

Challenges when practicing BYOD policies

Despite the benefits, BYOD policies can also impose several challenges for academic libraries. One of the main challenges is security, as personal devices may not have the same level of security as library-owned devices, and users may not be aware of best practices for securing their devices. Hence, libraries must implement robust security measures to ensure that sensitive data is protected, including strong authentication and encryption protocols. Another challenge of BYOD policies is compatibility, as different devices may have different operating systems and software, making it difficult for libraries to manage it ensuring an uninterrupted user experience. Therefore, it recommends that libraries offer a variety of options for accessing resources, including web-based interfaces and mobile apps, to accommodate a range of devices.

In conclusion, libraries must be prepared to adapt to changing technology and user needs. Further, implementing a successful BYOD program requires clear policies, device compatibility, robust security measures, device management, user support, privacy and confidentiality protections, and cost considerations. Careful planning and implementation can ensure the success and security of the program while providing library users with the flexibility and convenience of using their own devices. Finally, this novel notion may shed light on the long-term sustainability of academic libraries during the current economic crisis.

Obedient Research Assistant with [Unintentional] Academic Dishonesty? My Experience with ChatGPT-4

Introduction

It is indeed correct to say that only by working together for some time can one truly identify the character of another. Collaborating and interacting over an extended period allows both parties to gain insights into each other's strengths, weaknesses, and working styles. This deeper understanding not only fosters stronger working relationships but also enhances the overall effectiveness and efficiency of the collaboration. It is true in any close relationship, and I also realized that it is correct regarding work assistants. Investing time in working together is essential for uncovering the nuances of an assistant's character, leading to a more productive and harmonious partnership. This is the story of my journey through identifying the character of ChatGPT; a natural language processing tool driven by AI technology that allows you to have human-like conversations and much more with the chatbot (Ortiz, 2023). OpenAI developed ChatGPT based on the GPT architecture (*ChatGPT*, n.d.). Chat GPT-3.5 was released in November 2022. It is accessible as a free preview via <https://chat.openai.com>. A more recent version, GPT-4, is accessible upon subscription.

Areas in which ChatGPT Excelled

I started my relationship with ChatGPT in February 2023. Since then, I have used the tool daily while conducting various experiments relevant to my career as a researcher, teacher, and librarian. It's a wonderful

tool! I could write, summarize, and write code for fulfilling daily errands. It categorized word lists, wrote formal letters, and created tables from unorganized data like a pro. I could even use it for various tasks in teaching – creating lesson plans, preparing bulleted lists for presentations, and even building test questions. This included work in narrowly specialized subject domains such as the subjects I taught for the semester; Records Management, Principles of Archives, and Digital Libraries. I was happy to have my ‘learned’ assistant beside me.

Areas Exhibiting Weak Performance

The performance of ChatGPT in responding to my prompts (the commands or instructions given to the chatbot for generating output) was not always excellent. I asked it to provide authors of three famous works as a test. It gave two names correct. The third book was a Sri Lankan novel, *Beddegama* (translated as Village in the Jungle). It stated that the author of the novel is Martin Wickramasinghe. Wickramasinghe is a renowned author who has written his autobiography titled *Ape Gama* (literally translated to English as ‘my village’). But *Beddegama* was written by Leonard Woolf. It is unsure how it confused *Ape Gama* to *Beddegama*.

In another instance, while doubting its capability, I asked ChatGPT to assign a DDC class number to a romantic novel translated from Russian to Sinhala. It assigned a class number with clear instructions and an explanation of how the DDC should be used in this instance. However, an expert on classification later evaluated the skills as ‘novice.’ When the same prompt was given to ChatGPT 4, it generated a much more advanced explanation but still lacked complete expertise in this area. However, the skill of this assistant in completing that specific complex task is encouraging. On a humorous note, let me mention that Librarians need not be alarmed by the news! Let all technical stuff be assigned to robots! Librarians have more important work to do. Of course, they can oversee the work of robots!!

In addition, I used ChatGPT to write a poem on a topic in a specialized academic domain. It sure did! Not one, it wrote a series of poems with the same rigor of a poet. But when I asked it to translate the poems into Sinhala, it showed poor skills. It is understandable since the tool has been trained mainly in English and only a few other languages. To be a Sinhala translator, it needs further training.

A Serious Mistake!

Now I have come to the most interesting observation in this journey. I am a regular researcher. So how did my assistant support that? Of course, as a writing pro, it helps me in various ways – especially as a proofreader. But once I tried to generate a literature review. That is where it failed to the maximum extent!. I asked Chat GPT to create an article with some conditions to limit its scope. The actual prompt is given below.

“Write an article on the use of ChatGPT by academic librarians. Focus on its uses for the developing world. Maintain academic integrity. Limit to 800 words. Provide references with in-text citations.”

It cheerfully generated a text with in-text citations and a reference list as an obedient servant in seconds. It didn't complain at all! It was nice looking, and I thought I had minimal work left. I even added an acknowledgement stating that the article was almost completely written by ChatGPT, including citations. But alas! The references were all false! Because of my experience of getting inaccurate responses generated by ChatGPT, I CHECKED THEM!

Searching for article titles on Google Scholar generated zero results, suggesting that these articles never existed. Was it a clever formation of ChatGPT, the same way it writes creative articles and poetry? To make sure, I reached all journal home pages of the articles cited and visited the stated volumes and issues. Confirming my suspicion, they didn't carry the articles by the stated authors or titles. To further ensure this phenomenon, I asked ChatGPT to generate a text on a specific subject with citations. It did that, too, with much enthusiasm. Again, all the references were false! It even generated Digital Object Identifiers (DOI) that looked real. These also were imaginative. One DOI worked, but that directed to a completely different article.

Conclusion

In conclusion, ChatGPT demonstrates remarkable capabilities in various areas, such as engaging in casual conversations, providing general information, and offering creative suggestions. Its versatility and adaptability make it an invaluable tool for various applications. However, when it comes to scientific writing, ChatGPT executes with some limitations. It may not always provide the most accurate or up-to-date information, and its responses may lack the precision and clarity that is expected in scientific discourse. My recommendation is to warn the users that the citations could be false.

Despite these shortcomings, ChatGPT remains an impressive language model with immense potential. As the field of artificial intelligence continues to advance, it is anticipated that future iterations of ChatGPT will address these limitations (Bloomberg, 2023) and further expand its capabilities, making it an even more robust and reliable tool for users across diverse domains.

Why ChatGPT is good at journal paper writing

- *ChatGPT is not specifically trained for journal paper writing, but it can still generate text that is relevant to a given prompt based on its training data.*
- *Its ability to understand and generate text, combined with its vast knowledge of various topics and its ability to use that knowledge to generate coherent responses, makes it capable of assisting with various writing tasks, including journal paper writing, to some extent.*
- *However, the quality of its output will depend on the specific prompt and the training data it was exposed to, and the final output still requires editing and revision by a human expert in the field.*

Opening of the Library Studio at the Science Library, University of Colombo


The Library Studio at the Science Library of the University of Colombo was newly opened in January 2023 for the benefit of Science Faculty community.. This facility is equipped with a hi-tech video conferencing system. The venue is frequently used for viva voce exams of undergraduates and postgraduates of the faculty and other related activities, especially when working with resource persons from foreign countries. This facility was developed using the AHEAD grant received by the Faculty of Science, University of Colombo.

One Book to the Library

The library of the Faculty of Technology, University of Colombo was started with a couple of hundred books when the faculty was initiated in 2017. The faculty did not have a permanent building until 2020 and the faculty library was struggling to build its collection amidst the country's economic crisis. In this context, Mr. T. The faculty library will continue with this project to further develop the collection.



The library's interior design will also be upgraded to create a more welcoming and modern space. The renovation of the Library is expected to take several months (Approximately 12 months), during which time the library is partially closed. However, the library administration provides students with alternative access to required materials.
